Catalog Description: Regarding public spaces as the core of democracy. Examining different modes of publicness through different urban public spaces from the 19th century until today. The role of architects in promoting democracy. Contemporary activist architectural practices.

Course Objectives: Based on the theoretical framework of political philosophers Hannah Arendt and Jürgen Habermas, the course particularly focuses on public life as the core of democracy. It deals with different urban public spaces to understand different modes of publicness. Urban settings from the 19th century until today will be analyzed during the lectures. Besides that, the course explores the role of architects in promoting democracy. The impact of architecture on the elimination of hierarchy and empowering egalitarian society will be discussed in the analyses. Following that two perspectives, students will analyze either a public space or an example of politically engaged architectural practice.

Course Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, a student will be able to;

- 1. Identify democratic approaches through spatial settings,
- 2. Discuss different modes of public spaces,
- 3. Discover the role of architecture in promoting democracy,
- 4. Explore the impact of architectural practice on democracy,
- 5. Relate architecture to an egalitarian society.

Method: Readings signed by [*] in the weekly schedule are obligatory for all students. Other readings are highly recommended. Each student has to choose one of the weeks to moderate the discussion (20% of final grade) by preparing at least 3 questions which should be sent in advance by LMS forum. For the preparation of the term paper, a proposal (approximately 300 words) should be submitted and briefly presented on the week given below (20% of final grade).

Term paper: Students who are eager to search for a public space (either indoor or outdoor) can choose one, and discuss the history, and the features of that space in terms of different publicness. On the other hand, students who are curious about the role of architects in shaping an egalitarian and democratic society may select an example of an architectural practice as a way of activism. They can discuss the motivations of those architects and the impact of their practice. More than one selection is also welcome for a comparative discussion. The term paper has to develop a coherent argument through its discussions. It should not simply summarize the selected author's perspective but also present the student's questions and arguments through the discussion. The term paper should be around 1500 words in length, **footnoted, and referenced with a full bibliography**. **TEDU Manual of Style** should be used in the term paper (**60** % **of final grade**).
