**Catalog Description**: Epistemology as a category of philosophy. Epistemology of knowledge. Architectural research, Architectural theories, Paradigms, Discourses. Literature survey. Methods of academic publication ethics.

Course Objectives: This course aims to differentiate various philosophical approaches and understand epistemological relevance. It helps students to follow contemporary architectural discourses and concepts through literature surveys. By gaining an epistemological understanding, students will be able to criticize different architectural research methods. The course also aims to provide knowledge and critical understanding of academic ethics.

Course Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to;

- 1. Define different philosophical approaches,
- 2. Demonstrate the epistemological relevance,
- 3. Analyze different approaches of research methods in the literature,
- 4. Employ an appropriate architectural research method,
- 5. Write a well-structured and comprehensive text to support their main argument considering ethical issues.

Method: Readings signed by [\*] in the weekly schedule are obligatory for all students. Other readings are highly recommended. Each student has to choose one of the weeks to moderate the discussion by preparing at least 3 questions which should be sent in advance by LMS forum (20% of final grade). For the preparation of the term paper, a proposal of a literature review (around 500 words) should be submitted and briefly presented on the week given below (20% of final grade). The literature review will be on the subject that the student decided. The term paper as a literature review has to develop a coherent argument through its discussions. It should not simply summarize the selected authors' perspective from the literature but also present the student's questions and arguments through the discussion. The term paper should be around 2000 words in length, footnoted and referenced with a full bibliography. TEDU Manual of Style should be used in the term paper (60 % of final grade). Link for the Style: https://graduate.tedu.edu.tr/tez-formati AI-generated text is not allowed in this course. You may use AI for literature research, but you have to report and explain how you used AI, which programs you used, which sources were reached, and how you refined your research after you got sources from AI.
