1. Professionalism

Plagiarism: All assignments you hand in should be the result of your effort only. All assignments must be submitted with a cover page which includes; the name of your department, the name of the course with section code, affiliation and name of the instructor, name of the homework, your name, your id number and the date of submission.

Late work: You are supposed to turn in each assignment on time. I will only accept late assignments in unusual circumstances (e.g. documented illness). In all other cases, I will reduce %10 of the total point per day for late work, and the assignment will not be accepted after three days late.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Creative Drama Learning Reflection (3 reflections x 10 pts = 30pts): You will write a reflective blog post and share with the class via Google Classroom. Classmates will be able to see and respond to your post. There is no required length for posts, but aim to keep your posts concise, insightful, and engaging. Aim to use as few words as possible while capturing thoughtful and connected ideas. All posts require that you connect with course readings, and use APA in-text formatting to cite the sources used (Author, date – see the APA guide if you are unfamiliar with this format). Reflections will be graded based on a rubric that includes points for 1) insightfulness of reflections (2pts), 2) connections to course readings/discussions (2pts), and 3) clarity/professionalism of writing (). Blog posts are due by midnight on the Sunday evening before class - to allow time for your colleagues to read and respond to your post.

Reflection 1: What creative drama look like for you (list some indicators) **Reflection 2:** Portrait of a drama leader and self-review as a future teacher

Reflection 3: Opportunities of creative drama for children at schools

Midterm (30%): It will include multiple choice questions about character and values education topics. The topics will include all that will be covered up until the midterm exam. Students will physically attend the midterm exam in regular class hours on 24th Nov., 2021.

Writing Drama Atelier and Presentation (30pts + 10pts): You will prepare as a group (max. 2-3 persons) a "60-minute drama plan" and present this plan to the class within 15 minutes. The schedule of the plan, which should be delivered on the day of application, is attached to this document. Necessary documents and rubric for grading will be presented later.
